

Gospel Theme

Loyalty to Christ is the way of his disciples; we are joined to him by a bond that cannot be broken. Within the Church, we obey him, we serve him, and we follow him.

Sermon

Why do we read the Old Testament? Why do we go back to read such ancient writings, from today. Their God is our God. Their life is our life.

You heard how Joshua gathered the people together at Shechem. The people who were conquered, the Amorites, decided to worship the God of Israel. This Give thanks to God the Father, then, for everything, heard the Word, and made a decision. You do the forever and ever. same thing. You assemble in ranks. You hear the Word. And you make a decision. This too is a matter of history, your history. We know our past and our present; we choose our future. It is the experi- Blest are you, Lord, for bringing us out of Egypt, for ence of the Church. We are saved, together, with saving us from slavery, for protecting us from danother people.

The Church does not have all the answers. We know that. Jesus Christ spoke the truth, surely; yet his message is not always clear, in the present generation. We know that too. And yet, we make a decision. With Peter, we say, "Lord, you have the words of everlasting life." Where else would we go? What else can we do?

With Joshua, the people decided to remain together as a nation, as one body. With Peter, the disciples also make a decision for Christ. That's the point of the Gospel. It is not the Hellenic, Stoic household code of life that is decisive but Christ and the Church. With both Joshua and Peter, the option to leave is real. In both cases, the choice to believe is real.

Why, then, do we believe? In a certain way, it is because together we decide to believe, whenever we profess our faith, whenever we say the Creed, whenever we sing Amen, in response to the Eucharistic Prayer. It is the experience of the Church that we are saved with other people.

The Second Vatican Council taught plainly that God could have saved us as individuals. God could have made it a matter of personal choice. In fact, say the bishops of the Council, God does not save us in that way. The decision we make for faith is a decision we make together.

Pride killed Goliath

The bible in the first book of Samuel [1 Sam 17:12-54], narrates a story of a giant man named Goliath. He was a mighty man, a worrier, a Philistine hero, and a zealous fighter. He was a man who stood tall in the battlefield and won most of the battle he fought. After defeating all his enemies, he thought to himself that, there was no human being that could stood against him and survive. In other word, he was so confident that there was no created being who could have defeated him in a battlefield.

As the readers of the bible look at him today, we come to understand that Goliath was intoxicated with pride, naïve and narrow-minded. His pride did not even allow him to choose God to be part of his life and his doing. His pride made him think he was a superhuman who does not need God and others.

Certainly, he failed to grasp the fact that true human power and its competence, intelligence and its creativity does not depend on the size of the muscle but rather on the size of the human brain. No wonder in his last fight, he was defeated by a young man, David who was not even at the age of qualifying for military service. He was defeated by a young man who chose to believe in God and used his brain to fight against an enemy greater than his physical size.

Besides, Goliath was a general and a hero who didn't change his battlefield's tactics to match the kind of the battle and enemy he was fighting. He fought with the same style and looked down to his enemies without knowing what they were bringing in the battle. He mistakenly looked down to David and thought he was "just a nice, good-looking boy," [1Sam 17:42] and not a fighter.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church #1866, list pride as one of the seven capital sins because they engender other sins. It is one of the deadly sins. Pride is inordinate, disproportionate, extreme self-esteem. This kind of self-esteem because of its immoderate nature, has caused worriers like Goliath to perish in the hand simple people like David. It has caused nation to fracture, war to be waged, division to prosper, the sin of racism to continue to exist in our society. It has hindered development and bridges to be burnt to divide humanity. In short pride has generated unnecessary pain, loss, suffering, destruction, mistrust, injustice etc. in the face of the earth.

As a sin and source of other sins, the Catholic Church strongly advise us to fight against this sin by "putting on the apron of humility...for ... God resists the proud but show favor to the humble," [1Pet 5:5b]. St. Peter also decree in his first letter by saying, "Humble yourselves, then under God's mighty hand, so that he will lift you up in his own good time," [1Pet 5:6].

Thus, humble yourself, be and act simple and prudently because giants like Goliath were beaten by their pride. *Fr. Thad*
