SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDIANRY TIME

Gospel Theme: "In God we trust" is the motto of our country. With patience and endurance, we await the Resurrection. No matter what suffering may come, we are ready. If we trust in God, he will help us when misfortune strikes, either by offering a solution to the problem or by giving us the courage to endure it. The Gospel of Christ is our strength and support.

Sermon: Are you happy? Do you think your family is happy? Are people you know happy? In the Scriptures today, you find your own experience described.

Sometimes, you feel disappointed in everyone. As Jeremiah put it, "Cursed is the one who trusts in human beings. He is like a barren bush in the desert." In today's Gospel, "Jesus says you are happy, you are blest if you are poor, if you are hungry, if you are in tears, if you are rejected, if you are insulted." What kind of happiness is this?

- Well, for many, there is happiness in having a good income. In a survey taken 20 years ago, there were people who said they were "very happy." These were 43% of the people with incomes of \$90,000 or more per year. Of those with incomes below \$20,000 per year, only 22% said they were "very happy." Yes, at first, money does seem to bring happiness.
- But wait a minute. It turns out that once you reach a level of \$40,000 or \$50,000 a year, money doesn't make much difference anymore. In other words, if you're struggling to survive, if you're below the poverty level, yes, money does make a big difference. Professor David Schkade of the University of California teaches management in San Diego. He puts it this way: "Once you get to the lower middle class, then it takes a lot of income to make a difference. Income does matter, just not as much as people think."
- So, scholars are coming to the conclusion that our happiness is influenced not so much by our level of income but much more so by how we compare ourselves to our friends and co-workers. This may be why people with a high income say that they are "very happy." They don't seem that way to other people; they may seem grumpy or grouchy. Yet, when they think

about other people who earn less than they do, why, then, do they say that they are happy. It's the comparison that makes the difference, not the reality itself. After many interviews and much study, some researchers conclude that very wealthy people are often stressed out, working too hard, and preoccupied with many tasks, such as keeping up their houses. So, they aren't really very happy at all.

What makes for happiness? Psychologists have some suggestions, four to be exact. They say live near where you work; commuting is never a cause of happiness. They say that you should choose time over money. Cut back your hours of work, even if you end up earing less. Third, choose experiences that make you happy, in preference to possessions. Things you own just sit around and depreciate, anyway. Finally, spend your leisure time actively, perhaps with other people, perhaps in going out to eat, enjoying a good meal. These four ideas are the result of human science, or serious study and reflection. Perhaps they will make sense and be useful to you.

Most important of all however, is the teaching of Jesus Christ. In order to be happy, he tells us that deprivation may bring us to happiness: giving things away, fasting from food, accepting sorrow and loss, enduring rejection and insult. Yes, there is wisdom here and true happiness, for one and for all. Rejoice, for your reward in heaven will be great.

2022 ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

The past two years been difficult for us. We have all felt worn down. Exactly in these circumstances, the Lord speaks to us. He tells us that He is making all things new, and He invites us to share in that renewal.

So, it is appropriate and timely that we take up this year's Annual Catholic Appeal with the theme: making all things new...God's promise and our responsibility. As we embrace God's promise of making all things new, we also hear the call to work with God's plan. But how do we do this?

We pray and live out our daily responsibilities with love and generosity. We serve in the Church and in the world. We also support the Annual Catholic Appeal. When we promote the need, in programs of religious education and ministry formation to spread our faith, and in initiatives to address justice, peace, and respect for life.

As I am sure you know, and may be experiencing yourself, the Covid-19 pandemic continues to have a challenging effect at many of our parishes. Most parishes have experienced a decline in offertory since the start of the pandemic. Each parish's goal for the Annual Catholic Appeal is based on the prior fiscal year's offertory. For the 2022 Annual Catholic Appeal, goals are therefore based on offertory (Sundays, Holy Days, Christmas, and Easter) from Fiscal Year 2021. That fiscal year includes twelve full months of Covid-10 impact. Following normal business practice for Annual Catholic Appeal goad setting that means that mostbut not all—parishes will have a lower Annual Catholic Appeal goal this year than last year. Lower average Annual Catholic Appeal goals across the Archdiocese will make it more difficult to meet the needs of our most struggling parishes and schools, but the 2022 goals should reflect the reality of what you are experiencing at your parish.

As we build on our past collaboration, I ask you once again to follow the Appeal process, and whatever modifications may need to be introduced for this year. Most specifically, your 2022 goal is 4% of the previous year's offertory income. For Fiscal Year 2020-2021, your offertory income was \$178,195. Therefore, your target for the 2022 Appeal is \$7,128. As you know, when contributions exceed the goal, St. Martin de Porres will receive a rebate from those donated funds.
