

SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Theme: *Love of other people* is the heart of our religion. Even our enemy is to be loved. In fact, where love is living, faith will thrive.

Sermon: You heard the Gospel today, and it surely makes demands upon you: "Love your enemies. Do good to those who hate you." OK, what else? "To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other as well." "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

- How is this possible? Well, we hear stories that embody this teaching of Jesus. We hear of a firefighter who saves a child, in a burning building. We hear of a school principal who gently takes a gun from a student who is angry and violent. We hear of someone who donates half his liver for a transplant, for the benefit of a complete stranger. Why do people do things like that?
- For a long time biologists thought that all people are basically selfish. Psychologists were behaviorists; they said human beings are motivated by reward and punishment. In our time, however, scientists purpose a new viewpoint. Psychologists find that our feelings include a real intention to help other people. Biologists say that our ancestors learned altruism because that attitude is fostered by natural selection. People who care about other people live in groups that survive and prosper, evolution favors them. Today, then, altruism is seen by scientists as just as natural as selfishness. The teaching of Jesus, today, makes even more sense than ever.
- Bill and Melinda Gates, together with Warren Buffet, have donated millions to help other human beings.
 They are not the first philanthropists, and they will not be the last. The teaching of Jesus, the impetus of doing good to others, the instinct of altruism, is a reflection of the better part of our nature. Abraham Lincoln used a phrase reflecting this attitude; he spoke of "malice toward non, with charity for all." That's the same idea as today's Gospel.
- Why do some people do this? And why do others not do it? The difference seems to be in our experience

over the years, in our family traditions, in our church heritage, in our upbringing, in our heritage. Scientific studies of altruists have found certain experiences to be common among them, especially in childhood:

First, people who cared about others had loving parents, two parents, not one; parents who build up self-esteem in their children. Second, people who cared about others had parents who themselves showed good example, in charity and service to those in need. Third, people who cared about others grew up in an environment where there was right and wrong, where there was a moral code, where hurting others was known to be inappropriate.

The teaching of Jesus Christ is only effective within the family, within the community, within the Church. Together with people we are close to, we learn how to love, how to care, how to forgive, and how to live. The demands of Christ are serious; it is only within the Body of Christ that we will be able to put these teachings into practice. Alone, isolated, self-centered, we will fail. United, supported, guided, we only succeed. God grant us the better angels of our nature.
