FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDIANRY TIME

Gospel theme: Jesus Christ called the apostles and they followed. So it is today. Just as God sent Isaiah and Paul to preach, he sends us forth on mission. With loyalty and love, we spread the Gospel, the peach of Christ.

Sermon: You heard in today's Gospel how Peter had troubled accepting the call of Jesus; Peter said, "Depart from me Lord, for I am a sinful man." In the First Reading, Isaiah had the same problem. Isaiah was called by God to be a teacher, a prophet; yet he said, "Woe is me. I am doomed!" Both Peter and Isaiah knew that they were sinful men; they were reluctant to take on any public mission.

- As it was with them, so it is with you. Many of you may say immediately that the call of Jesus to evangelize is given to priests and deacons, maybe to special church workers. But that's not why the Gospel is proclaimed in your midst. The point of the Scripture is clear. Jesus wants all his disciples to spread the good news. Jesus wants all people to join his Church, and he can't welcome them in without you. That's why this Gospel is read today. Jesus says that from now on, you will be catching not fish, but men and women.
- We Americans are beginning to do exactly that. In the United States, all across the country, Catholic parishes have widely implemented the RCIA, the Rite, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. In this rite, people are gradually welcomed into the Catholic community, through a series of steps. In general, in our country, people go through the RCIA in about a year. This is a gradual growth in faith, a ritualized period of growth, leading up to the three sacraments of initiation, bap- Closing prayer: Father, you always complete what you tism, confirmation, and Communication. Most new Catholics complete the RCIA and are fully initiated at Eastertime.
- In a recent year, for example, about 65,000 people in the U.S. were baptized; another 93,000 came into full communion; they were already baptized in another Church. That's a total number of new Catholics of about 158,000. From diocese to diocese, the total varies. In the Diocese of Orange, California, 650 people

were baptized; over 500 others came into full communion. In Detroit, Michigan, 589 individuals were fully initiated into the Catholic Church; just under 500 joined us from another Christian tradition. Cincinnati, Ohio. had 437 people baptized and 606 enter full communion. These figures refer to children seven years of age and older, as well as adults. Babies are counted separately.

In most cases, people who became Catholic did so because of individual Catholics they worked with or lived with. In most cases, people see what faith means in the lives of believers; they then want that faith for themselves. Sometimes, they do research; they read the Bible on their own; they seek out further information. This sort of thing is happening all over the world, not just in our country. South Korea already has more Christians than Buddhists. China is said to be at least 10% Christian already; that would be 130 million Christians. In about twenty years, some of the largest Catholic countries in the world will be Congo, Nigeria, and Uganda, each with more Catholics than Italy, Poland, or Spain.

So don't hesitate to speak up about your faith. Don't be reluctant to tell others what you believe. Don't be afraid to be honest with other people. Above all, let your own faith be so real and effective that others can see it makes a difference. These are the ways you are all called to evangelize, to carry out today's Gospel in your own lives.

David love for his son Absalom [2 Sam 13:1 -19:9]

Absalom was the third son of King David from his wife Maacah, daughter of Talmai the King of Geshur. Character wise, Absalom was a kind of a son who looked like a policeman and judge at the same time, he catches and punishes wrong doers. Some can say he did not know how to control his anger and frustrations. This is a fair opinion when we look at what the Bible has told us about him.

Absalom had a beautiful sister named Tamar of whom him and his half-brother Amnon, loved her dearly. Amnon was the eldest son of David and his wife Ahinoam of Jezreel. The bible tells us that Amnon loved her half-siter Tamar to the extent that he became sick from the power of romantic love.

Not knowing how to control his emotions over his romantic love toward his half-sister Tamar, Amnon cowardly committed an intolerable crime and an insensate deed by violating her.

His half-brother, Absalom, upon hearing it, he became angry but hid his anger. He intentionally planned and killed Amnon for his crime and took flight to Geshur to his grandfather, King Talmai.

After three years, he returned to Jerusalem, and Absalom was pardoned from his sin of killing Amnon. But then he planned insurrection against his father King David and declare himself as a King in Hebron.

He organized his army and fought against his father's army, and he was defeated. However, King David had commanded that his army not to kill Absalom. But his army under the leadership of Joab defied King David's order and killed Absalom. King David wept and mourned for his son's death. He cried, "My son Absalom! My son, my son Absalom! If only I had died instead of you Absalom, my son, my son!" [2 Sam 19:1]. His crying demonstrated how much he loved Absalom even though as a son.

Well, David truly loved his son regardless of how his son was and what he did in life. David had preferred his own death rather than his son's death. For many parents, this action of King David is not new to them; they love their children unconditionally regardless of how good or bad their children might be.
