MARCH 13, 2022 SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

Gospel Theme: The Lord lives in light; Christ's transfiguration is a sign of our own. God made his covenant with Abraham with fire and smoke: God will make us anew in wonder and glory. In faith we acknowledge Jesus Christ as the Prince of Peace.

Sermon: In today's Gospel, we see Jesus transfigured before our eyes. For the disciples, this vision was a foretaste of the Resurrection. For us, in our lifetime, the Transfiguration is a similar experience. We know that in the resurrection of the dead, we will see Jesus and each other in a new light. In the First Reading, we learn that Abraham had a vision as well, a transforming experience of God. St. Paul teaches us that our bodies will be changed at the resurrection, to be like the glorified body of Jesus. We need such a vision of faith, in our lives. But that faith is not merely believing in Jesus and in the resurrection; no, the faith is also a whole complex of values, principles, and truths. People have actually given up their lives for the faith; we call them martyrs and saints.

- In our American culture, there are two principal attitudes towards faith. The first attitude, say of the ACLU, is that religion is a private matter, a personal choice. In our society, these people say, religion As you would probably agree, this is a very odd viewpoint. Down through the ages, faith has often been a matter of life or death, a critical system of thought for that, and you shall live. the whole community. In the United States, some deeply religious concerns have been fighting the evil of slavery, getting workers the right to unionize, resisting the influence of atheistic Communism, and protesting against racial segregation Ministers and priests have been involved in such concerns, for the benefit of all. So, the ACLU does not seem to have a good case.
- The second attitude you often experience is that faith itself is what is said to be important, not any particular faith. As Eisenhower famously said, I think people should go to church, and I don't care what church it is." In a recent presidential election, Mitt Romney, a Mor-

mon, identified himself as a "person of faith." So, according to this attitude, what is important is that a political candidate or an office holder be sincere in his belief. But his or her actual faith, its doctrine, is not something with which we should be concerned. This attitude is like saying that it is important that a politician be sincere in his attachment to politics itself, to the democratic process. By this thinking, it wouldn't mater if the politician were a Communist, a royalist, or a Republican, as long as he or she was sincere. This attitude is like saying that we should respect any scientist, as long as he is a person of science. By this thinking, it wouldn't matter if the scientist believed that global warming was a serious danger for the earth or that it was of no importance at all. No, reality is this. Genuine faith involves specific doctrines that are true or false. So, it does make a difference what philosophy the politician espouses, what science the scientist advocates. That is the point of faith. In fact, there is no religion on earth, with any substantial following, that says one religion is as good as another, that all that matters is that you be sincere.

This is why during Lent we recall the vision of Abraham, the doctrine of St. Paul, the Transfiguration of Jesus. We need a vision to live by, a specific religion which teaches what truths are eternal. Our Catholic faith is not just a matter of sincerity. It is a question of what we believe about should have no part in public policy or public debate. God, about Jesus, about the Holy Spirit, about the Church, about the Eucharist. This Lent, it is fitting to do penance. It is also fitting to study, to learn, to grow in wisdom. Do -Father Michael Gilligan, Ph.D.

GOD GLORIFIES THE HUNBLE

The prayer of Magnificat which is found in the gospel of Luke 1:46-55, is called the Canticle of Mary in which our Mother Mary testifies to Elizabeth that her soul rejoices in the Lord and proclaims the greatness of the Lord.

For those who are praying Breviary every day, know that this prayer of Mary is always being prayed at the evening prayers, after the proclamation of the short reading. It is a rich prayer which Mary proclaimed it, when she visited her kinswoman Elizabeth who was pregnant at an old age for her first-born, John the Baptist. Meanwhile at that time, Mary had received the news from the angel Gabriel, that she will be the Mother of God, Jesus the Christ. (Luke 1:32)

Reciting this prayer, you will realize that the words of Mary warn and inspire to enhance our understand that God, "has shown mercy for those who fear him in every generation and that he has shown strength of his army, he has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones and lifted up the lowly." (Luke 1:50-52)

Indeed, these are profound words of prayer that warn the citizens of this world not to strive for the mightiness, thrones, and proudness. But rather to humble themselves and become small like little children for the sake of creation and for the Kingdom of God.

According to Mary, God always lifts and exalts the humble. He rewards those who prefers the narrow rather than the big gate of the Kingdom. And I know many holy men and women, whom in my opinion, will receive this reward because they have humbled themselves to do God's work without wanting recognition from the public. And I know some of you brothers and sisters will be exalted too by God because you are profitable to Kingdom for your service for the people of God. I am sure you are now laughing and saying, "father you are kidding! Me! This will not happen to me!" Well think about the story that is being told by Abba John the Dwarf about an old man who humbled himself and did not want recognition. And the story goes like this: -

Abba John the Dwarf once said, "There was a spiritual old man who lived a secluded life. He was held in high estimation in the city and enjoyed a great reputation. He was told that a certain old man, at the point of death, was calling for him, to embrace him before he fell asleep. He thought to himself, if I go by day, men will run after me, giving me a great honour, and I shall not be at peace in all that. So I will go in the evening in the darkness and I shall escape everyone's notice. But lo, two angels were sent by God with lamps to give him light. Then the whole city came out to see his glory. The more he wished to flee from the glory, the more he was glorified. In this was accomplished that which is written: He who humbles himself will be exalted." (Luke 14:11)
