

### **ASCENSION OF CHRIST**

Gospel Theme for Today: Christ's Ascension into heaven is God's final acceptance of the offering of Christ. That is the sacrifice of Easter, completed and perfected in the gift of the Spirit. If Christ has come to glory, so, too, will we.

**Sermon:** The Gospel of Luke records that the disciples of Christ are to preach penance to the Gentiles, the pagans, beginning at Jerusalem. Jesus gives the disciples his blessing; then he was gone. The disciples "fell down to do him reverence," that is, they all prostrated themselves, flat, on the ground. After that, in Jerusalem, they were constantly in the Temple, speaking the praises of God.

- So, the apostles remained good Jews; they continued to pray in the Temple in Jerusalem, regularly. They were filled with joy, says the Gospel; they were happy. In our own lives, we have a similar experience. Jesus is gone; he has ascended to heaven. Yet, we still pray constantly. And we are happy.
- There are numerous reasons why people are "filled with joy," as the Gospel says. Let us consider just a few of these reasons. As Michael Fordyce points out in his book, Human Happiness, the first reason for happiness is social. Happy people have good social networks. They have healthy relationships with others. They are typically seen as kind and supportive of others. Is that not the nature of the Church? Even though Christ has ascended to heaven, apart from us, the Church remains here, the gathering of his disciples. For us, the Church is good social network. The Church is a home, where we experience and share the kindness of the Lord. The Church is where we get and give the support that human beings need. That is why the disciples of Christ were "filled with joy," constantly.
- There is a second reason, too. Happy people are productive people. Happiness is not something that is passively attained; rather, joy is found in action. From their roles in life, happy people derive a sense of meaning. They see their role in society as useful, as valuable, as meaningful. So, today, in the Church, people who pray together find value in their prayer, every bit as much as in their good works outside the liturgy. What was true of the first disciples is also true of us, today.
- It's valid, furthermore, to say that happy people hold a
  healthy self-image. Happy people posses appropriate
  self-love and self-respect. They recognize their faults
  and limitations, but they are grounded in a realistic
  knowledge of themselves. In the Church, one individu-

al or another may be lacking in this regard. But as a community, as a family, we know who we are. We are a people the Lord has formed for himself, a people of his choice. So, even if one individual has a poor self-image, together we know how blest we are and how he has given us great blessings, as a people.

True enough, Jesus in person, in flesh and blood, does not speak with us, does not interact with us, does not teach us. Sometimes, we don't know what he wants or what he would tell us to do. Sometimes, we don't know what to believe or even how to pray. But in spite of all that, we still are happy; we are "filled with joy" because of the blessing Christ gives us in his Church.



## PRAY AND SING LIKE PAUL AND SILAS IN PRISON

It is being said, the Catholic liturgies or prayer services are always quiet, organized, meditative and contemplative. Often most of the prayers are prepared beforehand and written down. There is little space for what we call "ad lib" or spontaneity. The new generation or young generation call our services or liturgies, boring or lacking connection between one Sunday to the next. I hear what they say.

Generally, from the pulpit observation sometimes but not all the time, it seems like, there is a minimal of active participation from the people' side, in singing, in responding to prayers and in being fully present at the worshipping services. We hardly clap at our Catholic liturgies and if we do we say that is a Baptist's spirit, we hardly do the liturgical dance and if we do we say that is destructing and time wasting from praying, and the list goes on and on. In other words, it is hard to ignore the feelings of young people that our services lack invigorating spirit.

However, the blame is always pointed to the Priests that he is not charismatic, that he is boring, that we cannot understand him, that he is not the best preacher etc. As such everything is left to one person and most Priests accept the responsibility to fall upon them. However, I think the blame is for everyone who come to our Catholic liturgies/services because each one of us bring his/her own spirit/joy of the gospel in liturgy. And so, when we come to services, it is good to ask ourselves, "which spirit of the gospel am I bringing to the service? Do I want to be an active participant, or I want to lay back and be a spectator of service? Therefore, the attitude we choose, is the attitude we put in the liturgy or services we participate.

Now, the Acts of the Apostles 16: 16-40, speak of the story of Paul and Silas in Philippi where they were imprisoned because of preaching the gospel and casting out the evil spirit. Though they were locked up tight in the inner cell with their feet chained between heavy blocks of wood, their worshipping spirit was not chained or prisoned. They brought the joy of the gospel in the inner cells of the prison. The bible tells us that at midnight Paul and Silas prayed and sung. They worshipped God while their feet were chained. The guards did not realize that it is possible to chain the hands and the legs, but it is impossible to chain the spirited mouth of a person. Paul and Silas sang hymns to God and other prisoners were listening even though they were imprisoned and were chained.

As a result of this, God brought a violent earthquake which shook the prison to its foundation, opened the doors of the prison and the chains fall off all the prisoners. Some can call this a coincidence, but I call it an effect of a powerful and spirited prayer and singing to the Lord. Well, if our Churches may inherit this midnight type of praying, singing and worshipping God like Paul and Silas, God will indeed shake to its foundation the prisons and the chains that makes us to be less active in our liturgy and worshipping services. So, brothers and sisters let us learn to pray and sing like Paul and Silas in our own prisons that hinders us to give the best to God. Let us learn to pray and sing like Paul and Silas that God may open the doors of our Church to allow fresh spirit to come in; pray and sing like Paul and Silas that we may be released from being spectators of worshipping services and become active participants of the praying and singing to God. Let us learn to be Paul and Silas in prayers and singing. God bless you.
