

# THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

## THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

Gospel Theme for Today: Today, we celebrate the Eucharist itself, the thanksgiving. The Mass is a blessing of God, a statement of praise and adoration, a prayer of gratitude, an act of acknowledgement; that is the meaning of the word, "eucharist." In each of the three cycles of Sunday readings, this feast has a different emphasis. In cycle A. the emphasis is on the bread, the body of Christ. In cycle B, the emphasis is on the blood of the new covenant. Now, in cycle C, the emphasis is on the act of thanksgiving, which we call Eucharist. In all three readings, there is a mention of a "blessing." a statement of praise and thanksgiving. Therefore, today, the emphasis is on the kind of prayer that the Eucharist is.

The emphasis of today's Scripture is that the Eucharist is thanksgiving, blessing of God.

- Back in the fourth century, as a reaction to heresy, the Church began to emphasize the Eucharist as a downward movement, a blessing given us, a grace, a benefit. Yet for the first four centuries of the Church's life, our emphasis was on the upward movement of blessing, the thanks and praise we give to God, the offering of sacrifice we render.
- What is a priest, then? Since the Middle Ages, our emphasis has been that the priest is a sacred person, said to have certain powers. He is the one who brings down to us the presence of Christ on the altar; he is the one who consecrates the bread and wine; he is the one who bestows on us blessings from God. This is a downward movement. In the Eucharist, our emphasis was on the consecration. Yet again, for the early centuries of the Church, the emphasis was otherwise. For the early Christians, our emphasis was on the upward movement of our prayer. Our focus was on what the priest does for us, in praying to God for us, in leading our sacrifice; the whole community was seen as holy. In the Eucharist, our emphasis was on the thanksgiving, the offering.
- You can see now how the early emphasis of the Church coincides with the examples given in Scripture. In the First Reading, the priest Melchizedek gives a blessing most importantly, he blesses God. He praises the creator of heaven and earth. St. Paul emphasizes the memorial character of the Eucharist; Jesus said it was to be done "in remembrance of me." St. Paul stresses that the Eucharist is a proclamation, a public announcement, an open statement of the death of the Lord. It is something of importance, because of what it

- says and what it means. Finally, today's Gospel recounts how Jesus "raised his eyes" to the sky and pronounced a blessing, just before the people ate. This prayer of thanksgiving is not incidental; it is important.
- The heart of the Eucharist is the Anaphora, the Eucharistic Prayer, the Prayer of Thanksgiving. It begins with the words "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." In the Roman Rite, the Anaphora ends with words, "Through him, with him, and in him, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, forever and ever." The people sing Amen to that doxology, and the Eucharistic Prayer is ended.

Today, some of the best theology on the priesthood will see the priest as not primarily another Christ, an alter Christus, but primarily as a presider, a leader of the Church's prayer, a spokesman for the community, a representative of the Church. Similarly, the Eucharist will have a clearer emphasis as the prayer of the community gathered on Sunday, the local assembly, here and now. Both perspectives are valid and true. But the latter emphasis is more in accord with the Scripture and the best part of our tradition.

## A STORY IS TOLD ABOUT THE STONES IN THE FOUNTAIN

A story was told to us by a priest (I do not remember word by word) about this fountain that people used to draw water from it for their use. Unfortunately, the water level started to become low, and not sufficient to provide water for all the people that depended on it like before. People started to speculate the reasons behind why the fountain did not have enough water. Some thought that was due to lack of rain while others thought it was God punishing them.

The decision was made to get into the fountain and dig deeper to see whether there was a new water current that could bring more water into the fountain. Young people were chosen and then were lowered into the fountain by a rope to investigate. On reaching the base of the fountain they were surprised to find the fountain base had many stones in it that prevented them to go deeper into the base of the fountain. So, they started to take out the stones one by one.

The more they took the stones out of the fountain, the more water level was increasing. They discovered the fountain did not lack water, but the presence of the stones had blocked water from filling the fountain. Indeed, when they removed all the stones, the fountain was filled again with water. Later, it was discovered that some children, because of their curiosity, were constantly throwing stones into the fountain without knowing the impact of their actions. Indeed, innocent actions sometimes can cause great discomfort.

Thinking about this story today, our life may be represented by this fountain that has water that bring vitality and attract people to come into our lives. Stones represents hardships and difficulties that sometimes are thrown intendedly or unintendedly to each one of us and leave us with scarcity of vibrancy. These stones can cause dryness in us, can cause discomfort, can attract people to come closer to us wanting to dig deeper into our lives to discover the abrupt change that have happened in our lives

Now it is good for us to discover what makes our lives dry. It is good to discover the kind of stones that have been thrown into the fountains of our lives and strive to remove them to bring vitality in our life. And sometimes, we just need some help from somebody else to take the stones out of our lives. Stones paralyze our live but its absence in us cause great joy. Therefore, are there any stones in your heart that bother you? Are there stones that bring dryness and coldness in your life? If so, please join St. Martin de Porres Church, for a healing mass with Fr. Brian Walker, next Sunday, (June 26, 2022 at 10am) for a healing mass. God bless you.
