SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME CYCLE C

Gospel theme: The power of prayer is real. As God heard Abraham, he now hears us. By baptism, we have new life; our sins are conquered by the cross of Christ. Christ's mother, Mary, is an example of prayer, humility, and obedience.

Sermon: I speak to you of prayer: our situation and the answer of Jesus Christ.

First, you know our situation. Sometimes, people don't pray because they feel they are unworthy. Perhaps they feel they are sinners. Perhaps it happens because of some sexual activity, perhaps because of something they did long ago. Perhaps because of a deep-seated feeling of guilt. After all, there are people who never pray. Who never go to church. Yet they say they are good. So, people think you have to be good to pray. Sometimes, too, people don't pray because they are too busy. Perhaps they are too busy helping people. Perhaps they are preoccupied with earning a living. Perhaps they have grown up and given up the prayers and the thinking of childhood. Above all, sometimes people do not pray because they don't know what to say. People don't know whether God really hears them. After all, God does not talk back. How do you know it makes any difference? All that is our human situation. 'Twas ever thus.

The answer of Jesus Christ is found in the Bible. In the Second Reading, St. Paul says that our sins are nailed to the cross of Christ. In other words, our sins and failings have nothing to do with our relationship to God. We should pray no matter what our sins have been, no matter what our sins are going to be.

Someone who has the disease of alcoholism must pick himself up, time and time again. It doesn't matter how many times he will fail. He must continue to believe, continue to hope, continue to struggle, and continue to pray. So it is with all of us. Our human weakness is no impediment to prayer.

It is not only the good who are called to prayer. In fact, you are not saved because you are good but because you believe. In fact, you, with all your sins, are still called to prayer. In fact, no matter how bad you are, no matter how great your failure, you must still pray, and pray as Jesus taught us to pray.

Remember the example of Martha, in the Gospel. Her feast day is July 29. She was too busy with the details of hospitality to pay attention to the word of Christ. Well then, do not be too busy with charity, even with earning a living; do not be too busy to pray, Sunday by Sunday, day after day. You owe that to God. You owe that to yourself. And you owe that to each other.

If you have given up the prayers of childhood, well and good. You can no longer have the simple belief you had as a child. You don't believe in miracles the same way. You don't believe in extraordinary interventions the same way. But you do believe. And that's what matters. You must pray as adults. You heard the Gospel. Today, Jesus Christ was speaking, not to children but to people who were grown up. He said that you must pray with confidence. If you, with all your sins, know how to give your children good things, how much more will the Father give you the Holy Spirit, says Jesus Christ.

Finally, some people say they don't know the words to say. Perhaps they are not sure of what they believe. In fact, you already have the words of the liturgy, the prayer of the Psalms, the voice of the Church. You don't have to reinvent the wheel. You don't have to make up your own prayers. You have only to say the words that the Church says. Therefore, join with your parents and grandparents, your brothers and sisters, your family members—lift up your hearts and give to the Lord our God your thanks and praise.

From the Desk of Fr. Larry... My brothers and sisters, I love the tone of the conversation between God and Abraham in our first reading. God is planning to destroy Sodom because its citizens have fallen into sin and depravity. Abraham, unwaveringly faithful to the Lord, begins to bargain with Him to save the city. It is touching how God, focused on retribution, is willing to let Abraham continue to push Him to reconsider destroying Sodom. Although we know the result, that God does destroy Sodom because Abraham can find no good person in the town, we can be encouraged that God would respond to Abraham's compassion and hope for a change in his kinsmen.

The Gospel presents us with the disciples seeking advice from Jesus on the proper words and attitude to pray. He says: Be open. Ask in all sincerity and you will receive; in all sincerity, seek and you will find; in all sincerity and deep belief that God loves you, knock and the door will be opened to you.

He gives them some words to express this in the form of what we call the Lord's Prayer. The Lord's Prayer has a richness to it that we often miss because we are so familiar with it, the words fall easily from our memory, and we rarely take the time to take in the fullness of the prayer:

Our Father: This is not a personal prayer, but a communal prayer. We each have a personal relationship with Jesus, but the prayer invites our consciousness of our interconnectedness with God AND with each other through our God. Hal**lowed be thy name:** God is already hallowed, holy, so the prayer really invites God's name to become more hallowed and respected in our own hearts. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done: Put simply, my kingdom – my ego, selfishness must go in order that Your love, Your will for me personally and in relationship to others - can claim a greater presence in me. Give us this day our daily bread: Daily bread is not just material food but, more importantly, the life-giving relationships that nourish our physical, emotional and spiritual wellbeing. It invites us to be 'daily bread' for others. Forgive us as we forgive others: To forgive literally means 'to give into new ways of relating with others.' It requires reconciliation, a letting go, and a turning toward new life-giving ways of relating to others, to ourselves and to God. Lead us not into temptation and deliver us from evil: Keep us focused on You and, when we falter, help us to get back on track on the path You would have us follow.

Remember, my friends, prayer isn't meant to change God, but to change us, to open us up to a deeper trust in the God who created us, sustains us, provides for us, forgives us immediately when we have sinned, and loves us back onto the path of righteousness, journeying with our fellow pilgrims on the path to a life well-lived and life eternal in the embrace of our loving God.
