**Baptism:** Please call the church office for appointment at least two months prior to date. A prep class is required. Parents should contact Deacon William Pouncy.

**RCIA:** Adults Seeking Baptism and/or Making a Profession in the Catholic Christian Faith should contact Deacon Greg Shumpert.

**Marriage:** Please contact the parish office before setting your date. The Church asks that couples be parish members for at least 6 months before setting a date. Participation in Pre-Cana and a Premarital Inventory required.

**Funerals:** Please contact the parish office before going to see a Funeral Director. We will accommodate the needs of your family to help you through the loss and healing.

Larry...** Happy New Year! No, I'm not getting ahead of myself! No, today, the First Sunday of Advent, is the actual start of a new Church Year for the universal Church. Interestingly, the Scriptures for this first Sunday focus us, not on the coming of Christ at Christmas, but on his Second Coming that is part of Jesus' promise of returning for the Final Judgement, best detailed in in Matthew 25.

So why start the season with this? First of all, what we are preparing for is not just the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas. No, it is really for us, to remind us that Christ is always seeking to be born more deeply in our hearts and minds, to be more a part of our lives, to conceive in us the possibilities of each and all of us bringing a deeper and more visible birth of love into our world.

Our readings call us to a vigilance, to a hope that resurrection and renewal of broken lives and spirits in our world will indeed happen through our unity with Christ. We are reminded again that our choice to follow Christ will cause division in our world, even among those closest to us. As painful as that can be, Jesus gives us the strength to persevere, to continue to be faithful to His mission which, sadly, doesn't always coincide with the agendas of certain churches, preachers and segments of Christianity, particularly these days by some evangelical white 'Christians' who place selfpreservation and political loyalties above the all-inclusive mission of Jesus Christ.

So what is Jesus asking of us as we begin our journey toward Christmas? Advent is a time, like Lent, to do some self-reflection, to assess our commitment to our faith, to Jesus Christ, to reflect on the spiritual divisions within ourselves and to commit to challenge and dismantle the forces of division and injustice in our world. The Advent Season offers us the opportunity for reflection, reconciliation and a renewal of hope so that, at Christmas, we can celebrate both the birth of Jesus and the rebirth of Christ's love within us.

There is a poem that I have loved for years that captures the spirit of this First Sunday of Advent. It is a poem written during the persecution of peasants, human rights activists, and church workers in Guatemala, many who lost their lives, living in fear of death daily. The poem, written by poet Julia Esquivel is still relevant for Christians today. Threatened with Resurrection... It is something within us that doesn't let us sleep, that doesn't let us rest, that won't stop pounding deep inside, it is the silent, warm weeping of Indian women without their husbands, it is the sad gaze of the children fixed somewhere beyond memory, precious in our eyes which during sleep, though closed, keep watch, awake. Now six have left us, and nine in Rabinal, and two, plus two, plus two, and ten, a hundred, a thousand, a whole army witness to our pain, our fear, our courage, our hope! What keeps us from sleeping is that they have threatened us with Resurrection! Because every evening though weary of killings, an endless inventory since 1954, yet we go on loving life and do not accept their death! They have threatened us with Resurrection Because we have felt their inert bodies, and their souls penetrated ours doubly fortified, because in this marathon of Hope, there are always others to relieve us who carry the strength to reach the finish line which lies beyond death. They have threatened us with Resurrection because they will not be able to take away from us their bodies, their souls, their strength, their spirit, nor even their death and least of all their life. Because they live today, tomorrow, and always in the streets baptized with their blood, in the air that absorbed their cry, in the jungle that hid their shadows, in the river that gathered up their laughter, in the ocean that holds their secrets, in the craters of the volcanoes, Pyramids of the New Day, which swallowed up their ashes. They have threatened us with Resurrection because they are more alive than ever before, because they transform our agonies and fertilize our struggle, because they pick us up when we fall, because they loom like giants before the crazed gorillas' fear... Join us in this vigil and you will know what it is to dream! Then you will know how marvelous it is to live threatened with Resurrection! To dream awake, to keep watch asleep, to live while dying, and to know ourselves already resurrected!

The Meaning of the Advent Wreath The Advent wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent. It is a circular candle holder that typically holds five candles. During the season of Advent one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday until all of the candles, including the fifth candle, are lit on Christmas Day. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the celebration of the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Most Advent wreaths use three colors of candles – purple, pink, and white. However, some may use blue in place of the purple.

1st CANDLE – (purple) THE PROPHECY CANDLE or CANDLE OF HOPE We can have hope because God is faithful and will keep the promises made to us. Our hope comes from God. "And again, Isaiah says, 'The Root of Jesse will spring up, one who will arise to rule over the nations; the Gentiles will hope in him.' May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:12-13)
