From the Desk of Fr. Larry...

It may shock you, but Jesus' religion was not Christianity or the original Christian Church that became the Catholic – meaning universal – church. No Jesus was a Jew, specifically a Jewish Rabbi. He grew up in a Jewish family, totally immersed in Jewish culture. He was likely exposed to the extreme prejudice against the Canaanite community. There had been years of animosity between Jews and Canaanites. As Jesus was growing as a human being into His full identity, He assumed His mission was solely to the Jewish community, especially to address the Jewish hierarchy who had strayed from God, focused on self-interest, power and power-over the Jewish faithful, already poor and oppressed by their Roman occupiers. What made it worse was those Jewish leaders seeking to build and preserve power, formed an alliance with the Roman occupiers. Sound familiar compared to today's culture?

In today's Gospel, Jesus is dining with his disciples and fellow Jews when a Canaanite woman interrupts their dinner, pleading on behalf of her daughter who is possessed by a demon. His disciples encourage Jesus to send her away. However, he responds to them, and perhaps her standing at a distance, that His mission is only to the 'lost sheep of Israel.' The courageous woman bows to Him and counters Jesus by again pleading her cause, not for her but for her daughter. Jesus still pushes back, seemingly calling her a 'dog' in his response. The woman again pushes Him again, "Please, Lord, for even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters." Pretty bold, huh?!

This causes Jesus to open his heart beyond His kinspeople to see that everyone, longed for and needed what He felt was His mission only to the Jews. He responds with respect and affirmation of this woman's faith in Him, her love of her daughter, and her hope that He could do something to again make her daughter and her family whole.

My friends, even Jesus had to grow into His realization of His unique purpose and mission, just like everyone of us must do. Our belief is that Jesus was conceived and born into the world as 'one like us, but without (original) sin. It doesn't mean that he didn't carry some of the prejudices that the Jewish community carried against Canaanites and other religious groups. Like racism in our own time, the stereotypes, judgments, abuses, the sense of inferiority and superiority over 500 years have become a part of our physical DNA; so it was likely true of the Jews in regard to Canaanites and vice versa. The only thing that can change that behavior is compassion, openness, kindness and a generosity of spirit. It took this Canaanite woman to help Jesus see that and ultimately enlarge the scope of His mission to encompass ALL God's people.

So what's the challenge and the Good News for us? I believe the challenge is to open ourselves to recognize our own prejudices, to think about why we believe negative things about others and perhaps, even more clearly, why we want to believe these things. The effects of trauma can be passed on to future generations through our DNA. It's a proven fact. There is historical trauma, generational trauma, the trauma caused by senseless violence, the actions of others and our own actions. The Good News is that Jesus, like us, had to have His eyes opened to see beyond any of those unconscious prejudices he carried in His DNA in order to change the trajectory of His life and mission to be the Savior, not just for the lost sheep of Israel, but for us all. We can do the same and Jesus can help us if we allow Him to do so.
